### **Turkey Thoughts**

As the holidays approach, I've been thinking about Wild Turkeys. Loss of habitat and hunting had reduced their numbers to as low as 30,000 in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century<sup>1</sup>, and by the 40s there were very small numbers in remote pockets in the States, and practically none in Canada. The numbers of wild turkeys have rebounded and the range has expanded to an area much larger than that in the pre-colonial days. The rare sight of a group of turkeys has become much more common now, and many of our members can count turkeys among their common yard birds.

So I'm thankful that the efforts of game wardens, birders, hunters, and wildlife conservationists have allowed us to enjoy more frequent sights of the bird that Ben Franklin, probably with tongue in cheek, thought should have been our national bird, in place of the bald eagle.
