24 February: **Scott Winton**: Mattamuskeet Waterfowl and Climate Change

Scott Winton is PhD a candidate studying environmental science and policy at the Nicholas School of the Environment at Duke University, He works in the Duke University Wetland Center under the direction of Professor Curt Richardson. Scott hypothesizes that wintering waterfowl may play a role in the mitigation greehhouse of emissions in wetland areas such as Lake Mattamuskeet. Join us as Scott explores this question and reveals the methods he is using to arrive at answers.

#### Rare Birds

This past December and January have been remarkable for the number of chaseable rare birds in North Carolina (chaseable meaning that they stayed around long enough for many people to be able to make a successful trip see them). How many of them did you see?

The rarity wave was kicked off by a November 26 report of a Snowy Owl at Cape Point on the Outer Banks. It remained for at least 10 days and was seen by many, and was soon followed by another, and another, report from many places in the state, eventually more than 20. Two (or more?) Snowy Owls that appeared on Ocracoke on December 30 have proven to be especially viewable, remaining until this writing. Peter Vankevitch has used his "beach-legal" Jeep to guide well over 100 people to see one or both of these owls.

Other rare birds that appeared in December and remained for long intervals included Cackling and Greater White-fronted Goose and Say's Phoebe near Creswell, Ash-throated Flycatcher at Alligator River NWR, and Harlequin Ducks at Oregon Inlet. Perhaps due to the exceptionally cold season, unusual numbers of Common Goldeneyes, White-winged Scoters, and Long-tailed Ducks have been widely reported. And there have been an above-average number of Western Kingbird sightings along the coast.

Most remarkable of all, and scarcely believable if there weren't a few previous records, a Band-tailed Pigeon (a species of the Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountains) appeared at feeders in Manteo on January 7, and continues at this writing. 150 birders had visited the home to see it as of February 1.
